REGULATIONS FOR THE THREE YEAR DEGREE COURSE(UNDER 10+2+3 SYSTEM)

Degree & Duration
1.1 The Three year Degree Course, leading to the Bachelor's degree in Arts, Science & Commerce of Sambalpur University shall consist of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III spread over a period of three academic years with each part extending over one academic year. The examination for each part shall be held only once a year as follows:

Part-I at the end of the first year.

Part-II at the end of the Second year.

Part-III at the end of the third year.

1.2 The dates of commencement of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III Examination shall be as follows:

Part-I third Tuesday of March

Part-II First Tuesday of April

Part-III Third Tuesday of April

2. A candidate for the Bachelor's Degree in Arts, Science or Commerce under these Regulations, shall be required to enroll himself as a student of one of the colleges affiliated to this Univ. & pass the examination of each part mentioned above.

Admission to the course
3.1 Any person, who has passed the Intermediate Examinations of this Univ. or the Higher Secondary Examinations of the Council of Higher Secondary Education, Orissa or any such examinations recognised by the Academic Council as equivalent thereto can seek admission to the Part-I class of this course in any of the affiliated colleges, provided that a student shall not be admitted into the B.Sc. course unless he has passed the qualifying examination in Science.

3.2 No student shall ordinarily be admitted in to the Part-I class of this course thirty days after the date of the publication of the results of the Annual Intermediate Exam. of this Univ. or the Annual Higher Secodary Examinations of the Council of Higher Secondary Education, Orissa or the date of reopening of the college after the summer vacation, whichever is later.

3.3 A candidate who, for some valid reasons, cannot take admission within the time prescribed under Regulations 3.2 above however, be admitted by the college concerned within fifteen days from the last date of normally admissions with late fee as prescribed by the University. The Principal of the college shall send the names of the candidates & the dates of admissions with the Bank Draft for the late fee collected, in respect of all

such late admissions to the University in one lot within thirty days from the last date of such late admission.

3.4 A candidate who has taken such late admission shall have the percentage of lectures calculated from the date of his admission.

3.5 A candidate who passes the Second (Supplementary) Intermediate Exam. of this Univ. or the Higher Secondary Exam. of the council of Higher Secondary Education, Orissa may be admitted into a college within fifteen days after the publication of his results, provided that late admission within ten days thereafter may be allowed on payment of a late fee as prescribed by the University. Candidate so admitted shall have the percentage of lectures calculated from the date of his admission.

3.6 Students who have passed Part-I & Part-II examinations are eligible to take admission into Part-II & Part-III respectively.

3.7 A candidate whose results of Intermediate/Higher Secondary Part-I, Part-II examinations are published late by the examining authority, may be admitted into a college within fifteen days of the publication of his results without payment of any late fee.

3.8 A student who has failed in only one or two papers in Part-I or Part-II Examination may, however, take admission into Part-II or Part-III as the case may be & clear his back paper(s) in the subsequent two examinations.

3.9 Where the Syndicate permits increase of seats in any college, or gives fresh affiliation to any new subjects in any college, the date of issue of the order in this regard shall be deemed as the date of publication of the results of the Intermediate Examination of this University or the results of the Council of Higher Secondary Education, Orissa in respect of the increased seats or newly affiliated subjects for purpose of admission thereto.

4. A candidate who has been admitted into Part-I course may be allowed change of subject (s) or combination of subjects by the Principal till thirty days after the last date of admission as prescribed in Regulation 3.3

No candidates shall however, be permitted to change his subject(s) or combination of subjects in Part-II & Part-III from those of Part-I which he, under these Regulations, is required to continue in Part-II & Part-III unless the courses of studies prescribed so require.

5.1 Any registered student of the University may be admitted to Part-I Examination for the Bachelor's Degree in Arts, Science and Commerce, if he has passed the Intermediate Examination of the University or the Higher Secondary Examination of the Council of Higher Secondary Education, Orissa, or any other examination recognised by the Academic Council of the University as equivalent thereto, & thereafter completed a regular course of study for not less than one academic session in the Part-I course in one or more colleges admitted by the University for such purposes in subjects which he offers & is sent up by the Principal of the college concerned after holding such test examinations as stipulated by the University/College. However, no candidate is eligible for registration to the Bachelor's Degree Examination in Science if he has not passed the Intermediate Examination of this University or the Higher Secondary Examination of the Council of Higher Secondary Education, Orissa or its equivalent in Science.

5.2 Any registered student of the Univ. may be admitted to the Part-II Examination for the Bachelor's Degree in Arts, Science or Commerce, if he has passed in all the papers of the Part-I examinations, or has failed in only one or two papers of the Part-I Examination (vide Regulation 3.8) & has thereafter completed a regular course of study for not less than one academic session in Part-II course, in one or more colleges admitted for such purposes by the University in the subjects which he offers & has been sent up by the Principal of the college concerned after holding such test examinations as stipulated by the University/College.

5.3 Any registered student of the University may be admitted to Part-III Exam. for the Bachelor's Degree in Arts, Science or Commerce if he has passed in all the papers of the Part-I & Part-II Exam. or has failed in only one or two papers of Part-I &/or Part-II Exam. (vide Regulation 3.8) & has thereafter completed a regular course of study for not less than one academic session in Part-III course, in one or more colleges admitted by the University for such purposes in the subjects he offers, & is sent up by the Principal of the college concerned after holding such test examinations as stipulated by the University/College.

5.4 A student who fails to clear his back paper(s) in two subsequent examinations after his first appearance in the examination concerned will have to appear thereafter in all the papers of that part.

5.6 A candidate who has passed in all papers of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III but failed in the aggregate of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III taken together may repeat one or more papers of his choice from

any part to make up the deficiency in aggregate. This chance shall be available to the candidate twice subsequent to his passing in all the papers of all the three parts.

Pass Mark 6.1 (a) The minimum pass mark for each theory paper is 30% of & Classification the maximum marks of that paper.

of successful candidates (b) The minimum pass mark for each practical paper is 40% of the maximum marks in that paper.

6.2 (a) A candidate, in order to pass the Bachelor's Degree in Arts, Science or Commerce of the Pass Course must obtain:

(i) not less than 30% of the maximum marks in each paper where there is no practical.

(ii) not less than 40% of the maximum marks in each of the practical papers and (iii) not less than 36% in the aggregate of the Part-I, Part-II & Part-III Examinations taken together.

Provided that the aggregate for passing the degree exam. at the end of Part-III exam. shall be the sum total of the aggregates of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III examinations taken together.

(b) A candidate who passes the Bachelor degree of the pass course as stipulated above, & obtains 50% or more in the aggregate in the first appearance (see note below Regulation 6.3 (d)) of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III examinations taken together shall be declared to have passed the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com.(Pass) Examination with 'Distinction'.

6.3 (a) A candidate, in order to pass the Bachelor's Degree with Hons. in Arts, Science or Commerce of Honours course must obtain:

(i) not less than 30% of the maximum marks in each of the theory papers & not less than 45% in the aggregate of the Hons. papers, where there is no practical.

(ii) in subjects where there are practicals, not less than 30% of the maximum marks in each of the theory papers, not less than 40% of the maximum marks in each of the practical pass & Hons. papers & not less than 45% of the maximum marks in the aggregate of the Hons. theory paper taken together and 45% of the maximum marks in the aggregate of the practical Hons. Paper taken together.

Provided that the aggregate of Hons. at the end of the part-III Examination shall be the sum total of the aggregate of Hons. paper of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III Examinations taken together.

(b) Candidates obtaining 60% or more in the aggregate & the Hons. papers of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III Examination taken together shall be declared to have passed the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. Hons. examinations in the first class & those obtaining 45% or more but less than 60% in the aggregate of Hons. papers shall be declared to have passed in the Second class.

(c) Those obtaining 30% or more in each theory paper, 40% or more in each practical paper where there is practical, but less than 45% in the aggregate of all Honours papers, but not less than 36% in the aggregate of all papers, shall be declared to have passed the degree examinations.

(d) If a candidate, having obtained the requisite marks for the award of the Hons. degree, obtains further a minimum of 50% in the aggregate of all the papers other than the Hons. Papers in the first appearance of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III Examinations taken together, he shall be declared to have passed the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (Hons) Exam. with 'Distinction'.

(Note : For the clauses 6.2(b) & 6.3(d), the first appearance shall mean that a candidate must have passed all papers of Part-I in the annual examination of the First year, all papers of Part-II in the annual examination of the Second year, & all papers of the Part-III in the annual examination of the third year without failing in any single paper of any part.)

Mode of Exam. & duration of papers. 7.1 (a) The examination in Arts, Science & Commerce shall be conducted by means of written papers & the same paper shall be used at every examination centre.

(b) There shall be practical examination in subjects in which it is prescribed.

7.2 The duration of examination for each theory paper carrying 50 marks shall be two hours & for each theory paper carrying 75 or 100 marks it shall be three hours.

The duration of practical exam. for the pass course carrying 25 or 50 marks shall be three hours. For the practical examination in Hons. carrying 50 or 100 marks, the duration shall be six hours.

7.3 The laboratory note book or the field work note book of each candidate who offers subject in which there is a practical examination shall be inspected by the examiners & it shall be taken into consideration along with the results of the practical examination for awarding mark. Each experiment in every note book shall contain the date of the experiment, signature of the student & the initial of the teacher with date, under whom the experiment was performed.

7.4 The question papers for the University Examinations in Arts, Science & Commerce shall contain alternative questions on the courses of study prescribed for the preceding year where such courses of study have since been altered or amended.

Course components 8. The course of study for the Bachelor's Degree Exam. (pass & Hons.) in Arts, Science & Commerce shall consist of the following components:

i) Foundation Course (ii) English, M.L., Compulsory course; iii) Core Course; (iv) Ancillary/Applied Course.

9. The total marks for B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (Pass) course shall be 1600 & those for the Hons. Course shall be 2000 as indicated in the table below;

(For Chemistry Hons., there shall be 3 theory +3 practical papers in part-I, 8 theory & 3 practical in Part-II 7 6 theory +6 practical in Part-III)

10.1 A candidate shall be required to attend 75% of the lectures, tutorials & practical classes taken separately in each subject during each academic session & condonation in exceptional cases may be granted by the Syndicate to the extent of 15%.

10.2 The Syndicate may grant further condonation of shortage in attendance to the extent of 5% in respect of candidate who represented the Univ. or State of deputation for any Inter Univ. or National Camp, competition, games or sports, to be recorded in writing by the appropriate authority.

10.3 A candidate may be permitted to take up one of the MILs, (Oriya, Bengali, Urdu, Hindi or Telugu) without fulfilling the requirement of attendance of lectures, if a college in which he is admitted is not affiliated in that subject. However a candidate may offer an alternative paper in English of higher standard in lieu of MIL enumerated above.

11.1 A candidates for admission to the Part-I, Part-II or Part-III application Examination in Arts, Science & Commerce shall specify the subject for admission or subjects or repeat papers in which he desires to be examined to the examination for the Pass or Hons. Examination in the application form prescribed for the purpose.

11.2 The application submitted by a candidate for admission to any examination other than the repeat examination in Arts, Science & Commerce shall contain a Certificate signed by the Principal or by a teacher nominated by him, of the candidate's (i) good conduct (ii) diligent study (iii) fulfilment of the conditions of attendance given in Regulation 10.1 & 10.2 (iv) satisfactory performance at the periodical & test examinations conducted by the college concerned. Failure to secure any of the aforesaid certificates from the Principal of the college will disqualify the candidate from being admitted to the examination.

Provided that a candidate seeking admission to an exam. under Regulations 5.4, 5.5 & 5.6 (clearance of back papers) need not obtain attendance certificate & the certificate of having passed the college periodical examinations & tests. He should, however, obtain the other certificates as required.

11.3 A candidate who has obtained the certificates mentioned in Regulation 11.2 supra, but for some valid reasons as certified by the Principal, has not submitted his application with the prescribed fee in due time for the examination for which he is eligible, may be allowed to register himself for the exam. on payment of a late fee prescribed by the Univ. in addition to the prescribed examination fees within ten days after the scheduled last date.

11.4 The fees payable for registration/admission to any exam. under these regulations shall be as prescribed by the University from time to time.

11.5 The fees paid by a candidate for a particular exam. shall be treated as having been paid for that examination only, & no part of the fees shall be credited towards his subsequent exam.(s) on the ground of his having absented himself from one or more papers.

Dropping Honours papers
12.1 A candidate taking Hons. course initially in a subject may choose in writing to drop the Hons. course & adopt the pass course, in the same subject at the time of submitting his application for the Part-I, Part-II or Part-III examination as the case may be & he would then appear at the pass course exam. & in the subsequent examinations.

12.2 If a candidate changes from Hons. to Pass in a subject at the Part-II or Part-III examination, the average percentage of the marks obtained in the papers of the Hons. subject at each examination previous to the change over shall be treated as the percentage of marks obtained in the Pass subject at the corresponding examination to determine his results.

Migration of students
13. Any candidate who has been registered as such in any other University of the State in Part-I and Or Part-II Examinations of such a University will be permitted to migrate to this University & to register for the examination of Part-II and or Part-III of this University proviso it does not entail violation of any Regulation of this University In such a case, the marks obtained by him in the Part-I and or Part-II Examination of the other University will be treated as the marks obtained by him in this University for the purpose of declaring his results.

14.1 The results of the three year B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. degree exam. & the classes to be awarded shall be determined on the basis of the combined results of Part-I, Part-II & Part-III Examination taken together.

The results of the Part-I & Part-II Examinations shall be published separately within fortyfive days after the completion of the theory papers of the respective examinations. The marksheet of these examinations shall be issued to each candidate on payment of the fees prescribed. At the end of the Part-III Examination, a consolidated marksheet of the examination of all the three parts shall be issued to each candidate on payment of fees prescribed therefor. A separate marksheet for Part-III examination may be issued to a candidate, if he so desires, on a payment of the prescribed fees.

14.2 (a) After the completion of Part-III examination, the Syndicate shall publish a list of successful candidates based on the marks of the Part-I, Part-II & Part-III examinations within fortyfive days after the completion of the examination of theory papers.

(b) There shall be separate lists of successful candidates for candidates of Pass & Hons. in Arts, Science and Commerce.

(c) The list of those candidates who pass in the first class in the Hons. course of a particular subject shall be arranged in the order of merit & the list of all other successful candidates of the Hons. course of that subject shall be arranged alphabetically college wise. In case a successful Hons. candidate obtains distinction, it shall be mentioned against his name in the list.

(d) The list of candidates who pass the pass course shall be arranged college wise according to the roll numbers. In case a candidate has obtained distinction, it shall be mentioned against his name.

15. The following shall be the maximum work load per week for teachers of different categories.

a) Principal	6 periods
b) Professor	15 periods
c) Reader	18 periods
d) Lecturer	21 periods

However, for reckoning of the above periods 18 lecture-classes of Hons. will be taken as equivalent to 21 periods of the pass course.

16.1 For B.A. (Pass) & B.A. (Hons.) each period shall be of 50 minute duration. Each practical class may cover a minimum of 3 periods. Each tut-orial & practical group will consist of a maximum of

16 students & in each Applied/Ancillary group there shall be a maximum of 64 students.

16.2 For B.Sc. (Hons.) each theory period shall be of 50 minute duration. A practical class will cover 4 periods. Each practical or tutorial group will consist of a maximum of 16 students & in each Applied/Ancillary group there shall be a maximum of 64 students.

16.3 For B.Com. (Pass) & B.Com. (Hons.) each period shall be of 50 minutes duration. Each tutorial group will consist of a maximum of 16 students & in each Applied/Ancillary group there shall be a maximum of 64 students.

16.4 The number of periods (Lectures/tutorials/practicals) to be taken for each course is given in the respective tables.

COURSES STRUCTURE
B.A. (PASS)

17. Foundation Course

(a) A student shall study two Foundation Courses in Part-I & two in Part-II. Each course shall carry 50 marks so that the Foundation courses for each candidate shall carry a total of 200 marks. Each course will be examined as one paper carrying 50 marks. No foundation courses will be taught in Part- III. There shall be no practical/tutorial classes in Foundation courses.

(b) A student may choose any two of the following subjects in part- I.

G R O U P - A

1. Evolution of Life
2. Science in Every Day Life.
3. Science and Society
4. Environmental study
5. History of Freedom movement in India & National integration.
6. Business and Society.

(c) A student may choose any two of the following subjects in Part- II.

G R O U P - B

1. Social & Cultural History of India
2. Social & Cultural History of Asia.
3. Population, Health & Nutrition Education.
4. Resolution of conflict in Society.
5. Growth of Moral & Spiritual Ideas.
6. Value System.
7. Business and Government.
8. Business Environment & Entrepreneurship.

COMPULSORY LANGUAGE/LITERATURE COURSE

A student shall take English & M.I.L.(Oriya, Bengali, Hindi, Urdu or Telugu) as his core & compulsory subject in all the three years of the course carrying a total of 200 marks in each subject. In part-I & part-II the student will have one paper carrying 50 marks in each of the subjects, English & M.I.L. at each examination & in part- III one paper carrying 100 marks in each of these subjects. However a candidate may offer an alternative paper in English of Higher standard in lieu of M.I.L. enumerated above.

19. CORE COURSES

(a) A student shall take two core subjects. In the part-I & Part-II each of the two core papers will be of 100 marks & in the part-III it will be of 200 marks each. No change of core subject chosen in part.I shall be allowed in part-II or Part-III.

(b) The subjects under core courses except in Core I (Comp.) are stated below :-

1. Anthropology
2. Economics
3. Education
4. Geography
5. General Principle of Law and Jurisprudence.
6. History
7. Home Science
8. Mathematics
9. Philosophy
10. Political Science
11. Psychology
12. Statistics
13. Sociology
14. Oriya or Sanskrit, or Hindi or Bengali, or Telugu or Urdu.

Provided that a candidate shall not be allowed to take up Mathematics or a subject in which there is a practical examination, if he did not pass in that subject in the Intermediate Exam./ Higher Secondary Examination (+ 2 Examination) or any other equivalent exam. A candidate may, however, take Anth., Home Science, Education, Psychology or Geography without having passed in that subject in his Intermediate/Higher Secondary Examination.

Provided further that no candidate shall be allowed to take up Statistics if he has not passed either in Statistics or in Mathematics in Intermediate Examination/the Higher Secondary Exam. or any other equivalent examination.

(c) For B.A.(Pass) core subject having practicals, the pattern or distribution of teaching will be the same as that for a Science core subject except that the practical hours may be minimally decreased to accommodate tutorial classes.

20. APPLIED/ANCILLARY COURSE

(a) A student shall choose two Applied/Ancillary courses of 100 marks each or one subject (if it occurs both in Part-I and Part-II) of two papers, 100 marks each, of which he will take one course or one paper in Part-I and the other in Part-II. In Part-III there will be no Applied/Ancillary courses. There shall be no practical/tutorial classes for Applied/Ancillary courses.

(b) A student may choose any one of the following in Part-I.

2. Rural Industrialisation.
3. Finite Mathematics.
4. Insurance- I
5. Trade Union
6. Local Self Government
7. Practice of Banking
8. Mathematics for special Science.

(c) A student may choose any one of the following in Part-II.

22. COMPULSORY LANGUAGE/LITERATURE COURSES

A student shall take English & M.I.L. (Oriya, Bengali, Hindi, Urdu, or Telgu) as his Core-I compulsory subjects in all the three years of the course carrying a total of 200 marks in each subject. In part-I and Part-II the student will take English one papers and M.I.L. One paper 50 marks each and in Part-III the marks for each paper will be 100. However, a candidate may offer an alternative paper in English or Higher standard in lieu of M.I.L. enumerated above.

CORE COURSES

(a) An Honours student shall take one core subject as his pass subject & another core subject as his Hons. subject. In part-I & Part-II the student will be examined in one pass core paper of 100 marks & two Hons. core papers of 100 marks each. In part-III the student will be examined in two papers of 100 marks each for the pass core subject & four papers

Provided to the candidate shall not be allowed to take up Mathematics or a subject in which there is a practical exam., if he did not pass in that subject in the Intermediate Examination/ Higher Secondary Examination (+2 Examination) or any other Equivalent examination. A candidate may, however, take Anthropology, Home Science, Education, Psychology or Geography without having passed in that subject in his Intermediate/Higher Secondary Examination.

Provided further that no candidate shall be allowed to take up Statistics if he has not passed either in Statistics or in Mathematics in Intermediate Exam./Higher Secondary Examination or any other equivalent examination.

(b) For B.A.(Hons.) subjects having practicals, the pattern of distribution of teaching will be the same as that of a Science core subject except that the practical hours may be minimally decreased to accommodate tutorial classes.

24. APPLIED/ANCILLARY COURSES

Special provision for passed candidates. 40.(a) A candidate who has passed the three-year degree course under these Regulations may on payment of the prescribed fees, be permitted to appear at the same examinations i.e. part-I, part-II & part-III at a time subsequently in any Core subject of the pass course in which he has not already passed without attending a regular course in a college, provided he secures 30% in each paper of each part. and 36% in the aggregate. If he takes up a subject in which a practical course is prescribed, he must produce a certificate from the Principal of a college under this University showing that he has completed the practical courses in a Laboratory. He must secure 30% in each theory paper and 40% in each practical paper in each part, and 36% in the aggregate in order to pass in that subject.

Such a non-collegiate private candidate should submit the Preliminary application alongwith the prescribed fees towards exemption from production of attendance certificate not later than one hundred and twenty days prior to the date of commencement of part-I Examination, or an such date as may be notified by the University.

(b) Once a non-collegiate candidate registers for the part-I examination, he need not submit preliminary application for part-II and part-III Examination but shall have to apply for admission to the part-II and part-III Examinations in the prescribed form and pay the prescribed fees for each examination within the date stipulated.

(c) No no-collegiate candidate shall be permitted to offer a subject in which there is practical unless he has completed all the practical courses of part-I, Part-II and part-III in a College affiliated to this University and submits such a certificate of completion from the Principal of the College concerned.

Award of Diploma. 42. Each successful candidate at the Examination shall receive with his degree, a Diploma in the prescribed form signed by the Vice-Chancellor.

Transitory provision. 43. In case there arises any anomaly or any difficulty in interpretation in respect of these Regulations, it shall be referred to the Syndicate for an interim decision to be notified by the Academic Council in its next meeting.

Subject: Regulations for the Three Year Degree course - promotion of
students to the higher class-Regulations 3.6. and 3.8.

Sir/Madam,

Paragraph 3.6 read with paragraph 3.8 of the Regulations for the Three Year Degree course provides that only such candidates as appear in the Part-I Examination, of the Three Year Degree Course and either pass it or fail in not more than two papers may take admission into the Part-II Course. Since there will be difficulty in implementing this provision in the current year the following transitory Regulation has been made by the Academic Council in its meeting held on 24.3.1986

Provided that notwithstanding any things contained in these Regulations candidates who appear at the Part-I exam. 1986 may be admitted to the Part-II Class during the session 1986-1987 only within fifteen days after the completion of the theory papers of the Part-I examination, 1986.

Accordingly students who have appeared at the Part-I Examination, 1986 may be asked to take admission in the Part-II Class within fifteen days of the completion of the theory papers of the Part-I Examination. Candidates who have applied for admission into the examination but have failed to appear therein are to be treated as having appeared in the examination for this purpose.

You are requested to give wide publicity to this transitory provision for the information of all concerned and to avoid any unnecessary hardship to the students.
