Academic Programme

The Department of Social Work at Sambalpur University, Odisha, offers a range of academic programs to prepare students for careers in social work and related fields. These programs are designed to provide a comprehensive education in social work theory, practice, and research.

1.Master of Social Work (MSW)

- This is a two-year postgraduate program that provides students with a solid foundation in social work theory and practice.
- The curriculum includes courses in social work methods, human behaviour and the social environment, research methods, social policy, social work methods and fieldwork/practicum experience.
- Students may have the option to choose specializations or concentrations within the MSW program, such as Human Resource Development (HRD) or Community Development (CD).

2.Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) in Social Work

- This program is designed for students interested in pursuing advanced research and scholarship in the field of social work.
- PhD students typically conduct original research, contribute to the academic literature in social work, and defend a doctoral dissertation.
- A student with an MSW degree is able to get admitted through an entrance test or NET qualification. After successfully finishing the Ph.D. coursework, the student can register for the Ph.D.
