Abstract of the Research work(max.300words)	Studying socio-economic and cultural in their spatial and temporal diversity along with its historical context has been beatable track among scholars of Indian history until recently in Odisha also no such work has been made to show the process of socio-economic and rise and growth of cultural centres in post- colonial period. Bargarh is situated on the left back of Jira River and is the district headquarters of Bargarh district. Foreed by government of Orissa a province of India i.e., Bharatavarsha. Though ring stone age and some stone implements are scattered

	<p>with iron slags, throughout the district, the area is not yet properly surveyed from anthropological points of view. No doubt, in early phase, there was Stone Age culture in this area. In recent years few anthropologists have found rock art which is Barabakhara caves and its vicinity of Barapahar hill. On Gandhamardan hill range, wall like rock fixations are found. they may be interpreted as megalithic cultural findings. Only traditionally, the wall like rock fixation on Gandhamardan is known as “Bhojagardh”, assigned to have been built by Bhojaras Deo, the fifth Chauhan raja of Patna, whose ruling period was within circa 1430-1455 AD. Its relics have not yet been surveyed on studies during proto-historic period, when there was state formation; this locality formed a part of Kosala State, which is usually known as Dakshin alias south Kosala, i.e. ancient Ayodhya Rajya (state). In historical period, this area seems to have been a part of the kingdom of the Nala dynasty, during 300 to earl the century A.D. and Sarabhapura is now identified with the present Maraguda valley of Nuapada district. As Bargarh area is situated and located adjacent to the east of Nuapada district. There is very possibility of most of the territory of this area to have been a portion of Sarabhapuriya Empire, during late part of 5th century A.D. to early part of the 7th century A.D</p>
